Shetland Fishing Facts

In 2012:

- ◆ There were 177 active commercial fishing vessels in Shetland, virtually all owned by local shareholder crewmen.
- ♦ More than **430 people** were directly employed in fish catching. Hundreds more jobs depended on fishing, in fish processing, marketing, transport, supply and engineering, for example.
- ♦ Shetland vessels landed £76 million worth of fish, in Shetland and elsewhere.
- ◆ £59 million worth of fish were landed in Shetland, by local and visiting fishing vessels.
- One fifth of all fish landed in Scotland was landed in Shetland (20%).
- One sixth of all fish landed in the UK was landed in Shetland (14%).
- Shetland vessels accounted for more than one sixth of all fish landed by Scottish vessels (18%), and more than one tenth of all landings by UK vessels (11%).
- ♦ More fish was landed in Shetland than in any other port in the UK, except Peterhead. Landings in Shetland were more almost double those in the 3rd ranked port (Fraserburgh).
- ♦ More finfish were landed in Shetland that in all of England and Wales.
- ◆ For landings of whitefish, Lerwick was the 2nd ranked port in the UK, Scalloway was 8th and Cullivoe 15th.
- Landings in Shetland accounted for 1.4% of all fish landed in Europe (in 2011).

Unless otherwise stated all figures are for 2012, the last year for which data are available.

Shetland Fishing Facts

In 2013:

- There were 173 active commercial fishing vessels in Shetland, virtually all owned by local shareholder crewmen.
- More than 386 people were directly employed in fish catching. Hundreds more jobs depended on fishing, in fish processing, marketing, transport, supply and engineering, for example.
- Shetland vessels landed £79 million worth of fish, in Shetland and elsewhere.
- ◆ £74 million worth of fish were landed in Shetland, by local and visiting fishing vessels.
- ♦ More than **one quarter** of all fish landed in Scotland was landed in Shetland (28%).
- ◆ Almost **one quarter** of all fish landed in the UK was landed in Shetland (23%).
- ◆ Shetland vessels accounted for almost **one quarter** of all fish landed by Scottish vessels (22%), and **one sixth** of all landings by UK vessels (17%).
- More fish was landed in Shetland than in any other port in the UK, except Peterhead. Landings in Shetland were more than double those in the 3rd ranked port (Fraserburgh).
- ♦ More fish were landed in Shetland that in all of England, Wales and Northern Ireland.
- ◆ For landings of whitefish, Lerwick was the 2nd ranked port in the UK, Scalloway was 9th and Cullivoe 12th.
- ◆ Landings in Shetland accounted for 1.4% of all fish landed in Europe (in 2011).

Unless otherwise stated all figures are for 2013, the last year for which data are available. Figures are based on analysis of data supplied by the Marine Analytical Unit of Marine Scotland Science, and of published fisheries statistics.

Shetland Fishing Facts

In 2014:

- ♦ **78,000 tonnes** of fish and shellfish, worth £76 million were landed in Shetland, by local and visiting fishing boats.
- ◆ Almost one quarter of all fish landed in Scotland was landed in Shetland (24%).
- One fifth of all fish landed in the UK was landed in Shetland (20%).
- ♦ More fish was landed in Shetland than in any other port in the UK, except Peterhead. Landings in Shetland were almost three times those in the 3rd ranked port (Fraserburgh).
- More fish were landed in Shetland that in all of England, Wales and Northern Ireland combined.
- Lerwick was the 2nd ranked port in the UK for landings of fish, Scalloway was 10th and Cullivoe (Yell) 14th.
- ♦ There were **179 active commercial fishing boats** in Shetland, virtually all owned by local shareholder crewmen.
- ♦ **386 people** were directly employed in fish catching. Hundreds more jobs depended on fishing, in fish processing, marketing, transport, supply and engineering, for example.
- ♦ Shetland boats landed 134,000 tonnes of fish and shellfish, worth £112 million, in Shetland and elsewhere.
- ♦ Shetland boats accounted for almost **one third** of all fish landed by Scottish boats (32%), and **one fifth** of all landings by UK boats (22%).

In 2013:

- ♦ Almost half of British landings of fish were caught within 100 miles of Shetland (46%).
- ♦ Three quarters of British landings of fish from the North Sea were caught within 100 miles of Shetland (75%).

Notes

Fish = demersal (whitefish) and pelagic fish.

'British landings'= total landings in the UK by UK and foreign boats, and by UK boats abroad.

Figures are based on published fisheries statistics and on analysis of data supplied by the Marine Analytical Unit of Marine Scotland Science.
